

Women's Center Loses Financing

Federal Finance Minister Michael Wilson's recent budget dealt a blow to the Antigonish Women's Resource Center, one of the few women's centers in the country. The center, which has been operating since 1982, is facing a \$100,000 deficit for the year ending in December 1991. The deficit is a result of a 10% cut in federal funding, which was announced in the budget. The center's income is derived from a variety of sources, including grants, donations, and fees for services. The deficit is a significant blow to the center, which has been operating on a shoestring budget for many years.

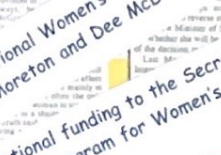

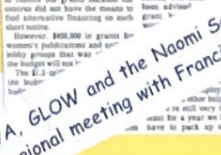
A day of Remembrance: A Time for Healing (a midday meditation for the anniversary of the Montreal massacre)

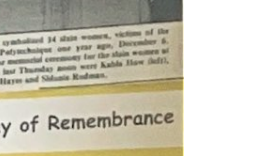

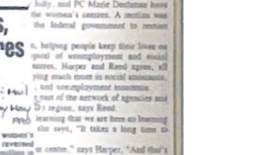

The centre's annual budget of \$141,000, which includes the cost of the building, is set to be cut by \$10,000 in 1990-1991. The centre's executive director, Katherine Reed, says the cut will force the centre to raise money from other sources to maintain the service. The centre has been operating since 1980 with the help of a federal grant provided by the Department of Social Services. The grant was part of a larger program to support women's centres across the country. The centre's services include counselling, legal aid, and support groups. Reed says the centre will continue to operate, but the cut will be a significant challenge.
