Coming this summer - Feminist Fridays.

The Antigonish Women's Resource Centre (AWRC) will hose weekly events in the coming weeks that will celebrate gender equality awareness, community and breaking the barriers while creating change.

The inaugural Feminist Friday will take place June 15, featurin a community art exhibit celebrating gender equality – This Is Wha a Feminist Looks Like.

The show will take place from 6 to 8 p.m. at People's Place Librar on Main Street in Antigonish.

"We have been gathering a lot of pieces," Cara Jones, one of th organizers, said, noting male artists have also made contributions t the upcoming event.

Since news of the show and other Feminist Friday activities bega circulating in the community, Jones said she has started to hear man men greet her with 'I am a feminist,' whether it is from across th street or down the sidewalk.

"The response has been awesome," Jones said.

After the art show, there will be a feminist film screening an discussion at the All-Of-Us Society for Art Presentation gallery space located at 319 Main Street (rear entrance).

Other Feminist Friday events in the works include a crafter market kids' art workshop and an end of summer concert.

Emily Gosse is working on a tourism related initiative aimed ε getting visitors more involved in AWRC events, while providing wide exposure for the organization.

"We want to have as many public events as possible and get th community involved," Gosse said.

Jones said Feminist Fridays are about "breaking down the barrier of what feminism is."

"It is about achieving equal rights for all genders," she noted.

Gosse added it is about eliminating the stigma that surround feminism.

"It is not a dirty word," she said, noting that "anyone can be feminist."

"It's not that you hate men," Caroline MacRae, AWRC Resistin Violence Project co-ordinator, added.

As part of the Resisting Violence Project, groups of youth i communities – young women – have been working on anti-violenc initiatives dealing with issues such as homophobia and sexual assault

"Issues tied to violence against women," MacRae said.

Feminist Fridays will provide some exposure for program participants as they continue work on their projects.

"It provides a supportive environment for them to showcase their talents," Gosse said.

MacRae added it will be "exciting to get the community involved. Gosse said Feminist Fridays is about raising awareness and gettin the message out to create change.

"That's it in a nutshell," MacRae added.
