Government supports initiatives

Antigonish Community Transit to work on plan

The Antigonish group, Antigonish Community Transit (ACT), is amongst 11 community organizations and municipalities receiving funding from the provincial government for public transit initiatives.

The group is receiving \$30,000 for work to complete studies and towards a business plan.

"Our organization is pleased with the funding we are receiving from the province which will help move forward with our transit an and put it into action," Jerome Grant, chair of ACT, said.

"More Nova Scotians will soon have an easier time getting around their communities thanks to provincial support for public transit," a release by the province stated.

"Through the Nova Scotia Transit Research Incentive Program, the province is investing more than \$237,000 in feasibility studies, business plans and door-to-door services for transit in rural and unserviced urban areas," the release further noted.

Antigonish MLA and Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal (TIR) minister Maurice Smith, on behalf of Service Nova Scotia and Municipal Relations minister John MacDonell, made the announcement regarding the funding at the Antigonish

Women's Resource Centre June 26.

"We know many Nova Scotians need access to transportation to get to work, school, medical appointments, or to visit family and friends," Smith said.

"Having public transit is important to communities throughout the province. This funding will allow 11 community organizations and municipalities to conduct feasibility studies, develop business plans and expand transit systems in their communities."

The program provides up to 100 per cent of eligible costs to a maximum grant of \$50,000 for approved projects.

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
