N.S. funds fight against sexual violence

Six First Nations groups to split \$150,000, Red Cross to work with communities

Leaders from six First Nations communities across the province, are pooling their resources to fight against sexual violence. The groups, which include the Mi'kmaq, Inuit, and Métis, have received a total of \$150,000 in funding from the Nova Scotia government.

The funding will be used to support a variety of initiatives, including community education, support services for survivors, and efforts to prevent sexual violence. The groups are also working with the Red Cross to provide support and resources to survivors.
