People in the struggle for justice!





- Teach-In on Poverty. October 17/18, 1999 involving dozens of churches, elementary school classes, high school classes, university seminars and classes and religious education classes from Antigonish right up to the Margarees.
- Provincial and national Wake-Up Call on Poverty – October 26, 1999 to mark the 10th anniversary of the unanimous resolution in the Canadian parliament to 'abolish poverty in the year 2000'. ACEJ organized the ringing of church bells, fire sirens, school bells, groups of individuals on street corners and the turnout of an entire elementary school to join in a wave of noise to "wake up" the parliamentarians and government to the need to fulfill their promise.
- Meeting on "The Victory in Seattle". Speakers on Globalization, The Effects of Transnational Agricultural Interference in the Majority World (example of Mali, in West Africa), and the Strategies and Tactics of Mass Demonstrations and Coalitions.
- Presentation by Rev. Keith Haggerman and Terry O'Toole on the "Breaking the Silence" delegation to Guatemala.
- Organized in collaboration with an initiating committee of six other groups and numerous individuals the Antigonish Participation in the World March of Women 2000 against poverty and violence. Thirty-two weeks of rallies at Town Hall kicked off by an outstanding gathering of more than 100 women and men on International Women's Day, March 8, 2000!

ACEJ gets no funding from government or foundations. Our activities are based on people power, not on the power of money. The funds we need are raised through contributions from members.



Formed in 1996, the United Nations Year for The Eradication of Poverty, The Antigonish Coalition

for Economic Justice is a collection of individuals and groups united in the desire to combine our efforts to work and struggle for economic justice. The coalition works on the basis of affiliation – groups or individuals can become "affiliated" with the coalition.

Groups and individuals voluntarily affiliate with ACEJ – ACEJ is a coalition – a temporary alliance of distinct organizations and individuals to engage in joint action!

In Antigonish, our ACEJ Coalition was formed by faith-based groups (for example Development and Peace, or The Social Action Committee of the Sisters of Saint Martha), social action groups (The Antigonish Women's Resource Center, or The Society for Affordable Community Housing in Antigonish), local labour unions (Autoworkers, Nurses, ...), and a broad range of individuals.

Our coalition has the core ideas that:

- people united in common cause are always stronger than when working alone,
- that a lot of the issues that are the main focus of one group will be important issues for other groups even if not their main focus,
- and that "unity" in a coalition means working together – not being the same!!



Purpose of ACEJ

The overall purposes of the coalition are:

- to share information between people working on issues of economic justice
- to share resources and work
- to take actions for economic justice
- to endorse actions already being taken by groups trying to build greater economic justice.
