Free speech' gives pornography fre Ō re ゴ to supporters

Censorship is so explosive and so labyrinkhine an issue that it would take several
cohumns just to touch on the main points.
It's dismaying, therefore, to realize that,
once again, in the public debate on the
pormography bill, one phrase will dominate every discussion, and one key element
will be virtually absent.
The phrase which shapes the debate, a
phrase made sacred and absolute by pornographers, pro-pornographers and civil
libertarians, not to mention writers, artists
and mediacrats, is "free speech."

The missing element is discussion of the deep, pervasive harm that pornography is inflicting on all of us.

The civil libertarians and pornographers the civil libertarians and pornographers will have the most free speech in the debate, and the victims of pornography will have the least. As always, the free-speechers will try to silence the anti-pornographers by ad feminam insult ("housewife," "prude," "anti-sex" and "fundamentalist" will be the most common and shaming terms of personal abuse) and the media, which naturally have an exormous financial and ideological stake in unfettered liberty, will give far more free speech to the freespeechers than to their opporents.

For those of us who cherish civil liber-

ties, the last decade has offered an extraordinary spectacle: that of the American and
Canadian Civil Liberties Unions, besotted
by noble theory, rushing to ridiculous extremes to defend Nazis, rapists and pornographers while resolutely ignoring the
grievous injuries these people inflict on the
civil rights of others. It's a classic case of
well-motivated but irrational excess.

Free speech is, indeed, a precious ideal,
though one much honored in the breach.
Society has long since recognized that
speech must be regulated in many ways,
most of them invisible and now taken utterly for granted. Journalists are daily prevented, by libel and contempt of court
laws, from reporting what could be relevant information. Government servants
are bound by oaths of lifelong secrecy: the
most ardent proponents of liberty for themselves will eagerly sue others to keep them

It strikes me that the people who have a corner on the free speech market in our society are pornographers, who enjoy an \$8-billion a year industry in the United States, and who can count on an automatic, impassioned defence by media and free-speech idealists.

Even the gruesome torture and debasement of women is now respectable, so long as it is done elegantly. When a Manitoba judge acquitted Penthouse magazine of obscenity charges, he cited the testimony of respected civil libertarian spokeswomen, who praised the artistic merits of the "strange and beautiful" photographs in question. The photographs (later ruled obscene by two Ontario courts) showed Japanese women hanged by their necks from trees, or naked, bound, trussed, with ropes tightly lashed around their breasts and through their genitals, and wearing death masks.

Much fine and and high-minded scorn is reserved for those femlnists, like me, who are concerned about the harm that such despicable — and widespread — images do. Civil libertarians demand rational, objective proof of harm. But no proof, it seems, will ever be good enough for them. When Linda (Lovelace) Marchiano described in detail how her pimp beat, brutalized and terrorized her linto performing in Deep Throat and pretending she loved it, her horrifying testimony was received in silence by the free-speechers. I know of no instance in which it moved them to reconsider. When women in rape crisis centres or battered women's shelters tell how their or battered women's shelters

The civil libertarian blindness and deafness on these issues is disturbing. We know, after all, that our sexuality is proknow, after all, that our sexuality is profoundly conditioned by society. Fashions in foundly conditions in clothes, change, at women, like fashions in clothes, change, at the dictate of men, every few years. Generations of little bows — almost all of them, in fact — get their sex education from Playboy and Penthouse, learning that bondage is sexy, that women are consumer items; and that violence is a turn-on.

walked in on a room full of teen-age girls giggling uneasily at the scene of the heroline, bound, trussed, gagged and moaning, forced to wait three hours at the altar for Petruchio. He swaggered in, beaming, and declared, "How bondage doth become thee!" The girls looked at me and said, "C'mon, it's just a joke!" Girls in our society learn to be good sports about bondage, oral rape and degradation. They have to because those porn images have seeped in everywhere. Nothing is free of porn imagery, from commercials, to circuses to videos to department store windows.

The Globe and Mail last week ran a story about a recent Writers Union meeting, where a debate on pornography had some authors shaking their heads in despair at the sheer ennui of dealing with anti-pornographers. Later, the authors heard a report on the appalling economic discrimination against women writers, who are still (surprise!) severely undervalued in our culture. No one, it seems, drew a connection between our prevailing male-dominant sexual culture and the seemingly ineradicable prejudice against women.

The porn debates will not go away; this time around, attention must be paid to women's agony, and a hearing given to women's solutions. More of that another




My Goddess Elders by Arminta Neal

My Goddess Elders manifested one day not too long ago, dancing out of the end of my Rapidograph pen and onto the paper. Id been thinking about the fact that I will be sixty-seven years old this year and, since my sixty-fifth birthday, have had a growing awareness of my own aging, a greater sense of journeying.

I'd been trying to produce images of Goddesses that would be meaningful to me in my own quest. The drawings were gloomy, serious and eminently unsatisfactory. I felt lost, in a way. Then suddenly two of these Goddesses flowed, cavorting, onto the page and I felt a sudden 'click.'

They were revealing Goddess to me as me in me. Yes—aging is a serious business, but it is also a very freeing time.
