- To foster youth development which includes: peer support, youth empowerment, youth-adult partnerships, meaningful contribution and experiential learning.





The HRY Team is made up of PDR teachers from each school, professionals from the community, and youth leaders. Together we bridge communication barriers, open up the silence around diversity issues, and teach Grade 9 students life skills that will allow them to pursue healthy relationships and solve conflicts peacefully and productively.
