- encourage non threatening behaviour
- actively outreach to include people with special interests
- not harm
- offer alternatives to violence
- model the vision
- include youth and elders
- be action oriented
- try to deepen questions not give easy answers
- create/develop an analysis
- promote feminist ideology and practice
- help define feminism, patriarchy and violence
- be a safe, non-judgemental forum for women and men struggling against violence
- promote supportive confrontation
- have good food

A good Topshee Conference on the theme, "Women and Violence", <u>Will</u>:

- raise awareness
- move the anti-violence movement forward
- facilitate personal changes
- support people in their work in communities
- promote a coalition for change
- reach people who have not been reached before
- be a collaborative effort with the community

- raise issues in the co-op, labour and religious sectors in their own context
- debunk myths about the transition house movement

Will continued

- increase the commitment of men to be non-violent and to support women in the struggle
- integrate the issues of violence
- affirm people of different sexual orientations
- connect people to the women's movement
- help men to understand the underlying causes of violence in our society and their role and responsibility as part of the problem and part of the solution
- examine the social and political construct of violence
- be helpful in assisting women and men to make healthful choices leading to non-violent lifestyles

OTHER ISSUES

- * Use of drama as part of conference design
- * Safety issues:
- process for dealing with emergencies or disclosures
- space in agenda for debriefing/cooling down between sessions
- designated "watchers"
- quiet rooms available
- * Planning committee needs to seriously consider the closing of the conference. It should emphasize and facilitate an atmosphere of healing and hope.
- * Conference P.R. should emphasize and promote the participation of men.
- * Registration for conference should be controlled and should attempt to reach a rough gender parity.
- * Conference mailouts should make use of the mailing list available through Debbie Forsyth-Smith
